SUBJECT: Qualifying

Please read carefully the entire memorandum to ensure a timely and proper qualifying submission as a candidate for Circuit Court Judge.

Qualifying period

Qualifying will be held from Noon, April 25, 2022 – Noon, April 29, 2022.

By law, the Division of Elections may accept and hold qualifying papers beginning April 11, 2022.

It is a candidate's responsibility to ensure that qualifying papers are timely received in this office and are complete. All qualifying fees and paperwork must be received and complete by Noon (Eastern Time), April 29, 2022, for a candidate to be qualified.

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What to file

	Appointment of Campaign Treasurer and Designation of Campaign Depository (Form DS-DE 9). If this form has previously been filed with the Division, you do not need to file it again.
	The candidate must file a candidate oath, Form DS-DE 303JU Candidate Oath — Judicial Office.
	Form 6 , Full and Public Disclosure of Financial Interests for the year 2021. Visit the Commission on Ethics (COE) for information on the current Form 6. For candidates who file their 2021 Full and Public Disclosure electronically, a copy of the electronically filed Form 6 can be provided during qualifying.
	If qualifying by the fee method, a candidate must submit a properly executed campaign check signed by the treasurer or a deputy treasurer in the amount of \$6,620.36.
	Any candidate oath, financial disclosure form, or qualifying check filed with the Division before April 11, 2022 , <u>is not valid</u> for qualifying. Please submit new documents to the Division no later than the close of qualifying period.
Ad	Iditional Filing Requirements
A c	Although not required for qualifying, each candidate must file a Statement of Candidate (Form DS-DE 84) and a Statement of Candidate for Judicial Office (Form DS-DE 83) with the Division of Elections within 10 days after filing the Appointment of Campaign Treasurer and Designation of Campaign Depository. Willful failure to file this form is a violation of Chapter 106, Florida Statutes.
	Although not required for qualifying, each candidate must file a Statement of Candidate (Form DS-DE 84) and a Statement of Candidate for Judicial Office (Form DS-DE 83) with the Division of Elections within 10 days after filing the Appointment of Campaign Treasurer and Designation of Campaign Depository. Willful failure to file this form is a violation of Chapter

Key points to remember

Timely Filing - Candidates may submit qualifying papers by mail, hand-delivery, or courier service. However, qualifying items must actually be received at the Division's physical location by the close of the qualifying period in order to be deemed timely filed. The U.S. Postal Service does not deliver mail directly to the Division of Elections. The U.S. Postal Service's designated hours for mail pick-up do not correspond to the qualifying deadline. To ensure that the qualifying items are timely submitted, a candidate or someone on their behalf should hand-deliver directly to the Division or use a delivery service that delivers directly to the R.A. Gray Building. The Division does not accept qualifying papers via facsimile or email. Note: The R.A. Gray Building is open to the public during regular business hours.

Notarized Oaths – Form DS-DE 303JU Candidate Oath – Judicial Office requires notarization. Carefully review that this document has been properly notarized. Common mistakes within the notarization are: the state rather than the county entered in venue; failure to indicate physical or online notarization; notary indicates online, but is not registered with the Florida Department of State to provide online notarization; and the notary seal with expiration date and name is not legible due to a light stamping, or stamping on a dark line.

Name on the Ballot - Type or print your name the way you wish it to appear on the ballot on the Candidate Oath. A candidate's name as it is to appear on the ballot may not be changed after the end of qualifying.

Contact Information - Please provide a telephone number and email address on the Candidate Oath where you can be reached during the day and after normal working hours. The Bureau will make an effort to contact you if there is a problem with your paperwork.

Qualifying Fees - Personal checks, cashiers' checks, cash, and money orders are <u>not valid</u> for qualifying. Qualifying fees must be paid with a properly executed <u>check drawn on the candidate's campaign</u> account. The check must be payable to the Florida Department of State, Florida Secretary of State, or Florida Division of Elections, and signed by the treasurer or a deputy treasurer. (A check signed by a candidate who has not been designated as the treasurer or a deputy treasurer is not valid for qualifying.) On the qualifying check (including a starter check), ensure the face of the check specifies that the check is from the campaign account, even if it is handwritten on the check (e.g., "Campaign Account of John Doe").

Qualifying Status - To check your qualifying status, visit: dos.elections.myflorida.com/candidates

Withdrawal - In order for a qualifying fee to be returned, the candidate must withdraw in writing <u>before</u> the close of qualifying. The withdrawal statement <u>must contain the candidate's signature</u>.
